President's Message

My focus for the coming year is to encourage renewed commitment to ethics in both our personal and professional lives. Breaches of ethics are a major part of the context in which we live and work. The media provides numerous examples of unethical behavior in business, government and education. Unethical behavior is explained away or excused because of circumstances or personal need (Craig, 1991). A "Machiavellian Orientation," or success at any price, seems to be the underlying message (Cho, Yoo, & Johnson, 2005).

Many examples abound. According to the Center for Academic Integrity (1999), approximately 75% of all college students report cheating at least once during their undergraduate careers. Similarly, the director of Eastern's Office of Academic Integrity recounts numerous instances of ethical violations. Other examples include selling counterfeit goods, tax evasion, employee theft, steroid use among athletes, unnecessary car repairs and corporate scandals (Callahan, 2004).

Several pressures within society prompt ordinary people to cheat. In the book, "The Cheating Culture: Why more Americans are doing wrong to get ahead," David Callahan gives three reasons why people cheat.

1. The gap between the rich and the poor; a winner-take-all environment worth huge sums of money
2. Fear of financial failure; anxiety; competition
3. No one is looking (sleeping dogs) so dishonesty is okay. Successful individuals get away with corruption.

To shift gears, if you were to tell someone about the mission or purpose of Family and Consumer Sciences, you might mention things like:

1. Improve daily life.
2. Address practical problems of families.
3. Help others create meaningful lives.
4. Help families meet their own basic needs and achieve their potential.
5. Assist consumers to make wise decisions.

The use of ethical standards is the foundation for achieving such important aims. Ethical standards are the basis of professional practice (Nickols & Belliston, 2001).

The "wellbeing" of individuals, families and communities is central to our purpose. The words "wellbeing" and "unethical" seem contradictory.

The AAFCS Code of Ethics (American Association of Family and Consumer Sciences, 2005) helps us know what to do in many situations. The Statement of Principles for Professional Practice includes professional competence, respect for diversity, scholarship and research, confidentiality, conflict of interest, and responsibility to the profession. This document serves as a guide for behavior. Nevertheless, we need other approaches to ethics because ethical dilemmas can be confusing and disorienting, and they cannot all be resolved with codes of ethics. Four additional approaches (Arcus, 1997) include:

1. The greatest good over bad
2. A sense of duty or obligation
3. Providing reasons for various actions
4. Consequences of action

Ethical dilemmas will always reside in our personal and professional lives. An important idea is to have as much integrity and courage as we can marshal. We need it. Again, it is my hope this year that we can all renew our commitment to ethics.

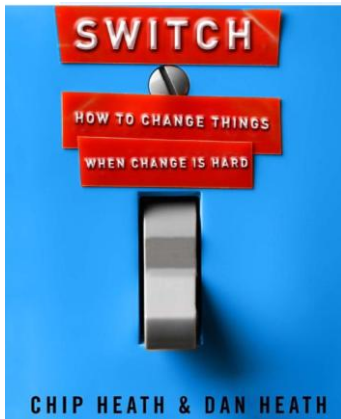

Ginny Ellington, new KAFCS executive secretary, graduated with a B.S. Degree from Morehead State University with Area of Concentration in Home Economics, and from Georgetown College with an M.A. in Secondary Education.

She taught in Bracken County, Pendleton County and Bellevue Independent, high school and middle school, and, in Pendleton County, was coordinator of the Gifted and Talented Program.

Ginny was in the Department of Education for 17 years, serving as State FHA Adviser for 11 years and State Supervisor for FCS Ed for 4 years. While there, she served as chair of the National FCCLA Board of Directors and received the FCCLA Distinguished Service Award.

Ginny retired in 2003 and went to the University of Kentucky as a teacher educator for seven years.

She has received numerous awards during her career, two of which were KAFCS Outstanding Professional and KAFCS Leader Award. Others include KACTE Arch of Fame, Outstanding Service and Outstanding Educator. She was the winner of Region ACTE Outstanding Educator Award and was a finalist at ACTE in 2009.
